

Class Gift Fund Report

We are happy to report a balance of \$26,185 in our class gift fund. This means we have met the threshold for establishing an endowment fund. The fund has grown by \$4,465 since our last newsletter in early August. Thanks to those of you who recently donated, whether for the first time or yet again. We have grown from 60 donors in early August to 63 today. Many who have contributed since August are repeat donors. Class members who contributed for the first time since August are:

Now that we have successfully met the requirement to establish our Class of 1970 endowment fund, we will focus on three things. First, we will continue to grow the fund - our goal is to reach \$70,000. For now, we will focus on reaching half that amount, \$35,000, by the end of 2019.

Second, we aim to increase the number of contributors. Currently, 63 out of 201 class members (31%) have donated. We hope to increase that donation rate to 50% by the end of 2019. This means 38 new donors between now and December 31. By the time of our reunion, we hope to increase this rate substantially—wouldn't it be wonderful if we had 100% participation?

Third, we will be exploring options for what to support with our gift. In the next newsletter, we will detail the steps we will take toward deciding the purpose of our gift. We welcome ideas; ultimately all of us together will decide what we will support.

Nikki often travels with a CODA companion. She says it's safer in unfamiliar areas than traveling solo because she's a female, deaf and older now. Also, it's more fun to share the experience with him.

Nikki says it's scary to get lost especially when you don't understand the language. To compensate for this problem, she memorizes the signage and the surroundings of her hotel to help her find her way back. Having a travel companion makes a huge difference when one gets scared. The scariest experience was walking through a ghost town in Mazatlán in the dark, but they didn't meet anyone. WHEW!! She says it's important to be calm in problematic situations, which is not always easy when you are shaking like a leaf.

Nikki's upcoming plans are to visit are Hungary and Egypt and safari in Africa. When asked why she loves to travel, she replies that it's because of her curiosity, sense of adventure, and about experiencing new places and cultures. Travel brings her joy and gives her something to look forward to as well as providing her with new and fun challenges.

The best places to visit for her are Norway and Mazatlán, Mexico.

Nikki thinks Norway is the most beautiful country in the world. In Norway, by chance, Nikki came upon a farm with the sign "EKLEVEGEN". She wondered if they were her relatives and checked to see if they were. Sure enough, they were on her paternal grandfather's side. What an amazing and happy discovery!







In Mexico, Nikki met a 2-year old deaf girl, and fell in love with her. They became good friends, and Nikki makes an annual trek to visit her. She's now 22 years old now with a son and a husband.

The challenges of being a traveler are whether or not to trust strangers, how to communicate in a different language, not to lose your passport, not to get lost, and to be relatively careful about what you eat and drink. Nikki and her companion did experience a bout of food poisoning.

Nikki says it's important as travelers to remember passport and itinerary at all times. Losing them is no fun at all. It's also important to bring a first aid kit, hand sanitizer, toothbrush and toothpaste, and oh yes, charger cord for phone or tablet.


What was your nost enbarrassing moment here?

QUESTION BOX

What is your real ambition? Why do you wish to achieve it?

After the first question, which I am asked by my friends, "Why did I travel such a long way to Gallaudet College?" My answer is sim-ple and direct, "To broaden ny educational knowledge and understand the nethods of teaching the deaf! The wellorganized teaching program here is nost advantageous to ne, as South Africa lacks a high standard of education for the deaf especially the negroes, who need educational training badly. Out of thirteen million inhabitants in South Africia, two thou-sand negroes and white doaf people, partly supported by the Government, when they have financial difficulties, receive their educational rraining at four or nore different scholastic institutions within the territory. Naturally, their ambition is to receive more education at Gallaudet College, the world's only college for the deaf.

A few months ago, a secretary for the South

Africa National Council for the Deaf, under the government's authority, traveled throughout the country to discover if the deaf people living on the farms were educated. After his survey, he proclaimed at the meeting that there were about five hundred deaf people who were nostly kept under the care of their parents without receiving any education. The secretary nade a strong plea that the Government establish more educational institutions for the deaf.

retary's speech I asked his Lordship, Bishop Green, who is responsible for the educ-

ational faculities for the negroes, whether I could fill the vacancy by becoming a missionary for the deaf. His Lordship consented and recommended that I study sociology to aid me in my work for the deaf. My reason for coming to Gallaudet College is to complete my education so that I can aid the deaf negroes and

white people in South Africa after my graduation.
