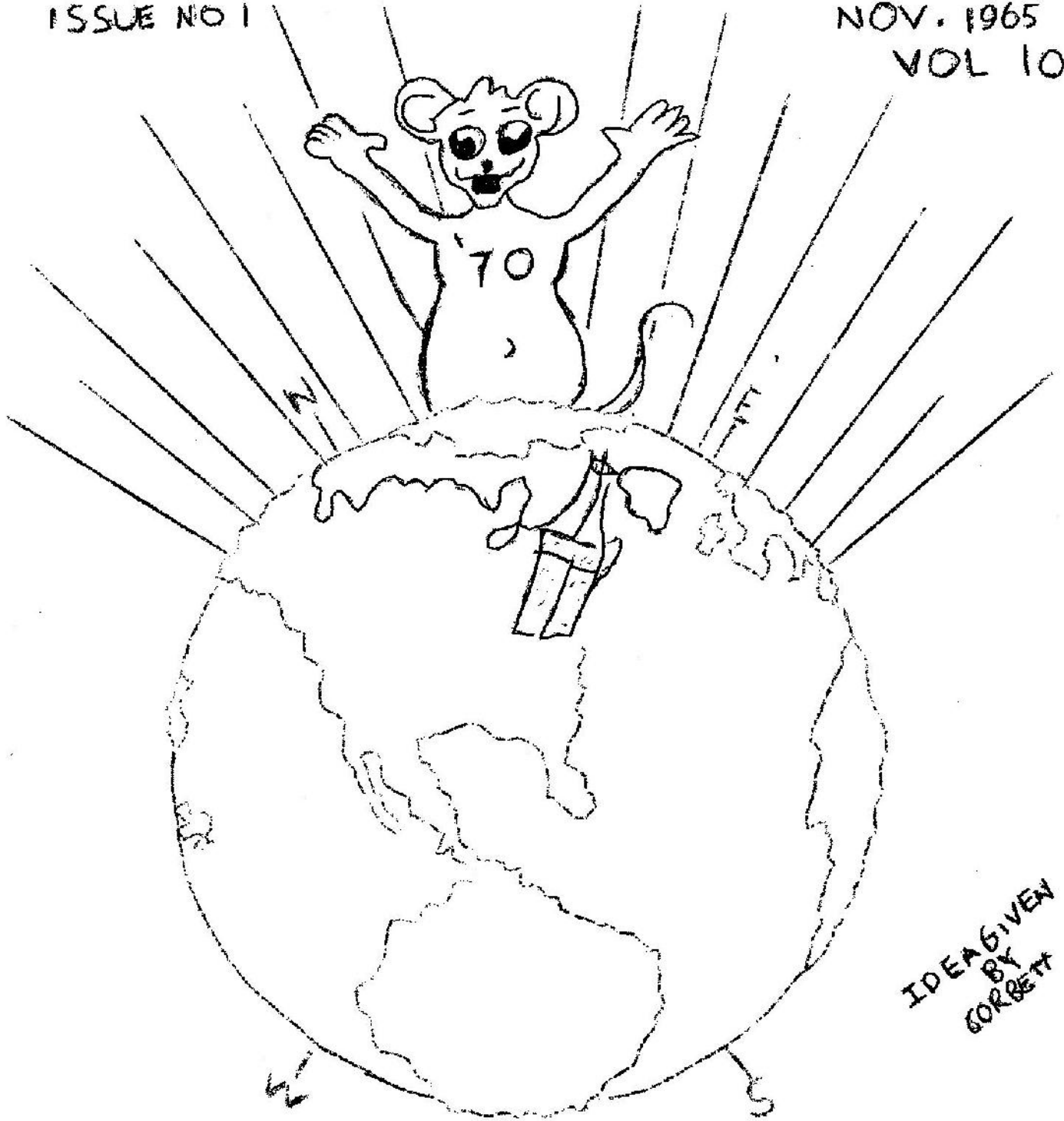

A president of the fabulous class of '70, I am very proud that our class will publish the Knob Hill News. I believe that it will be a successful and interesting edition.

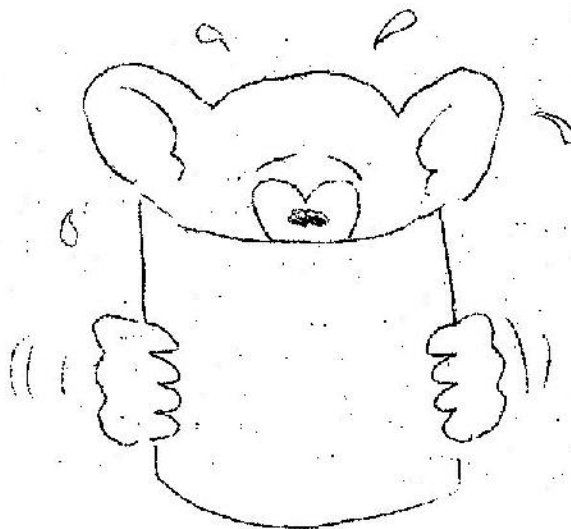

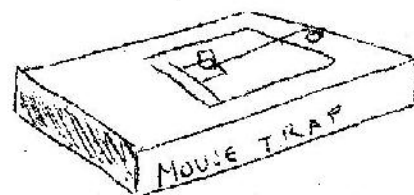

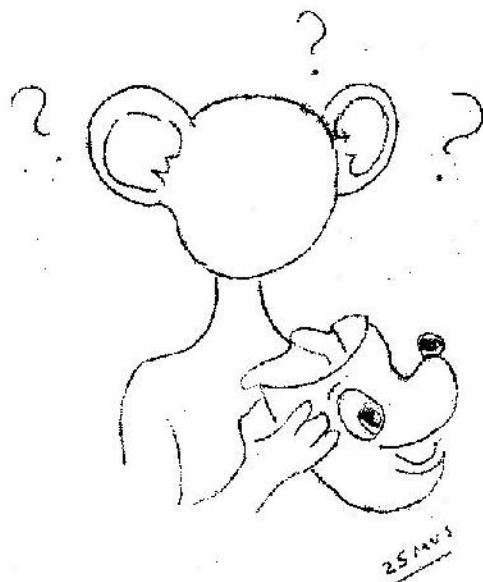
The Preparatory class had a Halloween party on Oct. 30, 1965 in Chapel Hall.

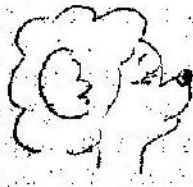
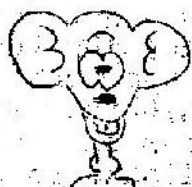
