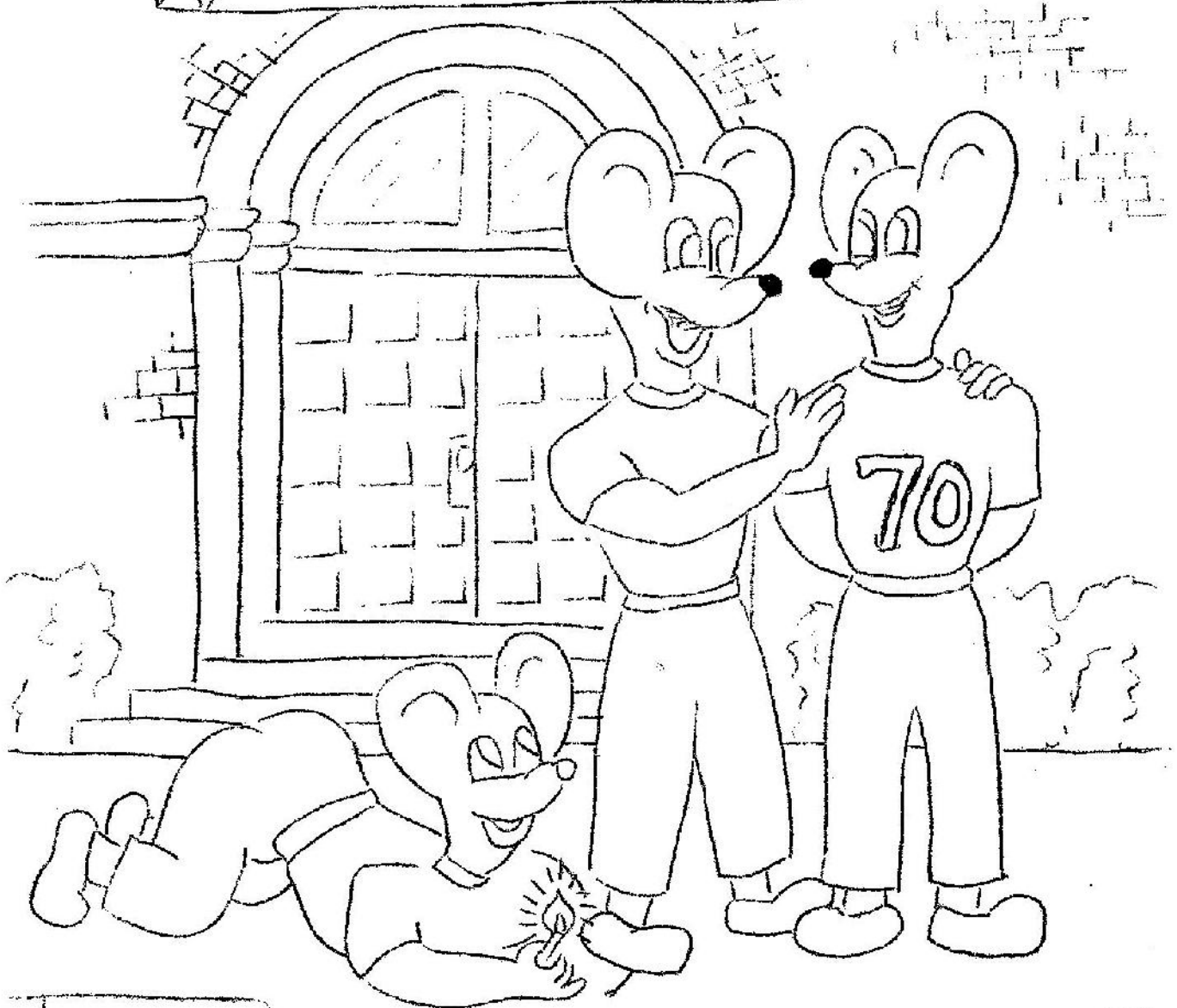

Although I studied English for several years at school in Japan, I hardly knew how to sign what I wanted to say in English, so as soon as I arrived here, I was really surprised at the way people sign. Signs you see every second are very different from mine, as well as your language, which is not the same as mine at all. I think your signs are more expressive than mine.

There were many unexpected things about which I could not help feeling uneasy, in spite of knowing something about the American

way of life from movies, books, etc. Do you know that in Japan every car must be driven on the left side of the road? At first whenever I was waiting for a bus here which, of course, is driven on the right side of the road, I found myself searching for the bus in the opposite direction as though I were a rustic sight-seer. What would happen if the front of the bus had struck my precious head?

The other day when I was just about to pull open a door, a boy behind me instantly pulled it and made me go in first. This event seems like nothing to you, but it was the first experience I had ever had, and I decided that I must make up my mind to forget about being a Japanese girl. Well, I would no longer like to relate anymore of my blunders.

I notice that most American people are very out-going and friendly. They all smile at each other. They seem to know how to enjoy themselves by means of parties, movies, and so on. While I lived in Tokyo, I sometimes attended parties, but no one thought that we had to dance at every party.

Everybody on campus knows how to state his own thoughts and to get along with others. Some young get along with others. Some young people in Japan are so shy that they can't do what they should do. To become better acquainted with one another young people at home are going to have to absorb some American habits.

In regard to the studying attitudes of students in both America and Japan, I found there is no difference. Whatever they study, there are lazy students, ambitious students, etc.

In conclusion, it is true that foreign students will have to "do in Rome as the Romans do." and I hope our life will develop more fully due to various experiences while we are living and studying here.

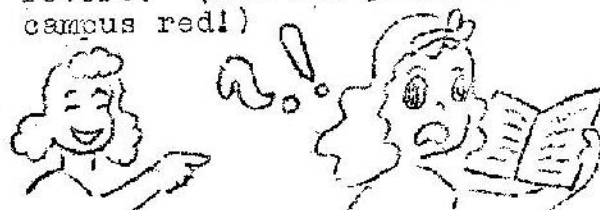
