May Camp---May 13: 14: 15: 1966

Well, gang, it will not be much longer. Just another month and we will all have the time of our lives! We are going to give you an idea of the camp site, which is large and something for everybody.

Camp Letts is situated on the Rhode River just a mile from Chesapeake Bay. It is on a 219 acre peninsula which is owned and operated by the Y.M.C.A. of the city of Washington.

The beautiful camp is only thirty-four miles from Washington near Mayo, Maryland and some ten miles south of Annapolis.

Twenty-seven screened cabins dot the main campground. Each cabin contains ten bunks which can hold 4 double-deckers and a couple of singles. Just think, ten of you guys and dills in one cabin together. Separate, of course.

Waking facilities are located in several centrally located buildings in each of the four sections of the camp area.

Other buildings are a Dining Hall, with an open porch, Recreation Hall, and Craft Hall, each of which has a fireplace.

An outdoor Chapel, which seats up to 300, three outdoor campfire sites, a couple of softball diamonds, football field, basketball court, volleyball court, badminton court, three hardsurfaced tennis courts and a horseshoe area are also available.

In addition, there are twenty rowboats and a beach with a waterfront dock.

Groups can check out athletic equipment such as softballs and bats or equipment for the other courts except for tennis rackets and balls. Any equipment broken will be paid for by the groups.

Dining tables seat ten persons and one person will be a waiter for each table. Meals are at 8 a.m., 12:30 p.m., and 6:00 p.m.

For personal needs we should

bring at least two blankets, sheets and a pillow case if you require one. Bring clothes to really rough it up in, shorts, swim suits, a sweater or jacket.

Also you should bring a raincoat and hat, extra shoes or overshoes, flashlight and toilet articles with a towel, washcloth and soap.

The Trading Post is open for twenty minutes following the noon and evening meals. You will find what you want there.

There will be a counselor for every ten to twelve persons.

Plans are that we will be there Friday afternoon and leave Sunday afternoon after dinner.

Mr. Turk has arranged everything for us and the weekend should be a big success. The Camp Committee will go out to the camp site with Mr. Turk to get an idea of what it is like and give you all an up-to-date report later.

This outing will be like a farewell party for us as not too many weeks after that we will head for home.

But, we will remember this for the rest of our lives, so do come and have a jolly good time!
